

COURSE STRUCTURE

Service Learning and Community Service are added to an Intensive English study plan. Both courses have three stages:

STAGE 1 Preparation & Placement			
WK 1	Course overview, share personal ideas about volunteering		
WK 2	Study the elements of American resumes, learn about potential placement sites, begin writing resume		
WK 3	Edit and revise resume, discuss questions about placements		
WK 4	Learn about cover letters, write cover letters, discuss placement options		
WK 5	Study effective email communication, edit and revise cover letters		
WK 6	Practice interview skills, start making final presentations		
WK 7	Explore personal expectations and motivations, discuss reality vs. expectations		
WK 8	Discuss placements, practice interview skills		
WK 9	Give final presentations		
WK 10	Final exam week – no class		

	STAGE 2 US Workplace Culture
WK 11	Learn about workplace communication, explore potential volunteering situations, compare cultural approaches to a variety of situations
WK 12	Give presentations about service placements, role play responses to difficulties, describe future goals

SERVICE LEARNING AND COMMUNITY SERVICE DIFFERENCES

Differences	Service Learning	Community Service
Volunteer Hours	120 hours over 6 weeks	35 hours over a 10-week term
Volunteer Period	After final term of Intensive English	During 2nd term of Intensive English
Volunteering	Full-time volunteering 20 hours per week	Full-time study in Intensive English + 4 volunteer hours per week

Service Learning: This course is ideal for students who want an in-depth volunteer experience. Students can explore two different non-profit organizations for an extended period of time. Plus, they get to choose from a wide variety of interesting organizations, explore different interests, and work toward future goals.

Community Service: This course is perfect for students who want to focus on English classes and add a volunteer experience to their study plan. Since volunteering takes place during an academic term, one benefit is that students can use their 60-day grace period to travel or have free time in the US.







REQUIREMENTS

- Students must have intermediate (or higher) language skills when starting Stage One. This is equivalent to B1 on the Common European Framework, or PIA's Level 3.
- Students in Service Learning must be in their final term at PIA. Volunteer service takes place during the 60 days after the end of full-time study.
- Community Service students must enroll in at least two terms of Intensive English.

VOLUNTEER SITES AND TASKS

Over 100 non-profit partners welcome Pacific International Academy students. Some examples include:

- Boys and Girls Club Help in after-school programs for children
- Bus Project Take part in US politics to motivate young people to vote
- Forest Park Conservancy Dig into nature while learning about land conservation
- Hollywood Theatre Assist in film-making classes for youth
- Multnomah County Offices of Citizen Involvement Help government offices reach out to diverse populations and translate documents
- Solar Oregon Assist organizations that advocate for solar energy
- St. Andre Serve food and distribute supplies to homeless people
- Willamette Falls Media Center Produce public television programming to broadcast
- Hosteling International Northwest Assist at the front desk and give visitors tours and directions to local sites.
